Public to Public Partnerships (P2Ps) hanno lo scopo di promuovere coordinamento e collaborazione tra attività di ricerca a livello nazionale e regionale. Le P2Ps allineano strategie nazionali e regionali aiutando ad aumentare efficacia ed efficienza di investimenti pubblici in Ricerca. P2Ps prevedono un'ampia varietà di azioni congiunte, come bandi transnazionali e altre forme di collaborazione. Le reti P2P includono ERA-NETs, Iniziative ex. Articolo 185 e Joint Programming Initiatives (JPIs).

JPIs

Joint Programming is a structured and strategic process whereby Member States agree, on a voluntary basis and in a partnership approach, on common visions and Strategic Research Agendas (SRA) to address major societal challenges. On a variable geometry basis, Member States commit to Joint Programming Initiatives (JPIs) where they implement together joint Strategic Research Agendas

Art. 185

Article 185 of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union (TFEU) enables the EU to participate in research programmes undertaken jointly by several Member States, as well as in the structures created for the execution of such joint programmes. Article 185 initiatives represent the closest integration of national and EU programmes thus far.

EJP Cofund

The European Joint Programme Cofund (EJP Cofund) is a new type of instrument introduced in Horizon 2020 in 2016, previously used in the context of Euratom. The main purpose is the implementation of a joint programme of activities, mainly direct research and innovation activities (through calls for proposals resulting in financial support to third parties), but also allowing coordination and networking activities, including training activities, demonstration and dissemination activities. The total duration of the action is fixed at 5 years

ERA-NET

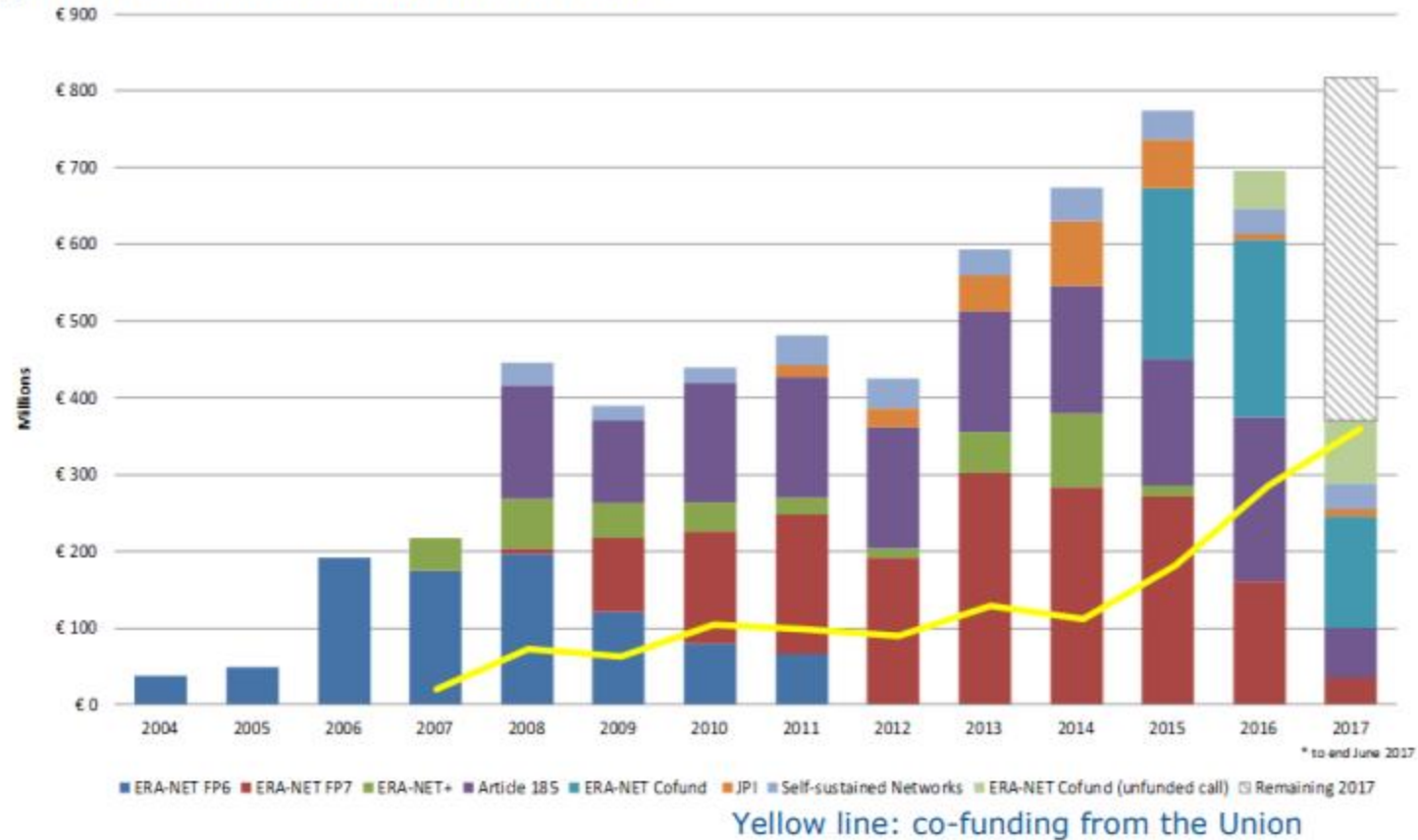
The ERA-NET instrument under Horizon 2020 supports public-public partnerships in preparing, implementing and coordinating joint activities by financing coordination activities of national / regional programmes as well as topping up national contribution to joint calls.

TIPOLOGIE DI P2Ps

P2Ps, since their introduction in FP6 have created an amazing ecosystem. From the initial 71 ERA-NETs created in FP6, a total of more than 260 networks have now been supported during the past fifteen years. Currently there are 98 active networks and in addition to the 28 EU Member States, a total of 13 Associated Countries and 29 Third Countries participate in P2P calls. This is impressive considering that the initial participants were 14 EU Member States and 2 Associated Countries in 2004. The EU support of P2Ps across the different FPs has increased significantly, from €380 million in FP6 (2.1% of the FP6 budget) to €802 million (1.4% of FP7 budget) in FP7 and to approximately €2.500 million in Horizon 2020 (around 3.1% of the budget). This investment has mobilised national contributions that have increased exponentially over the years despite the recent financial crises, i.e. €1,250 million under FP6 to an estimated €6-8 billion until the end of Horizon 2020.

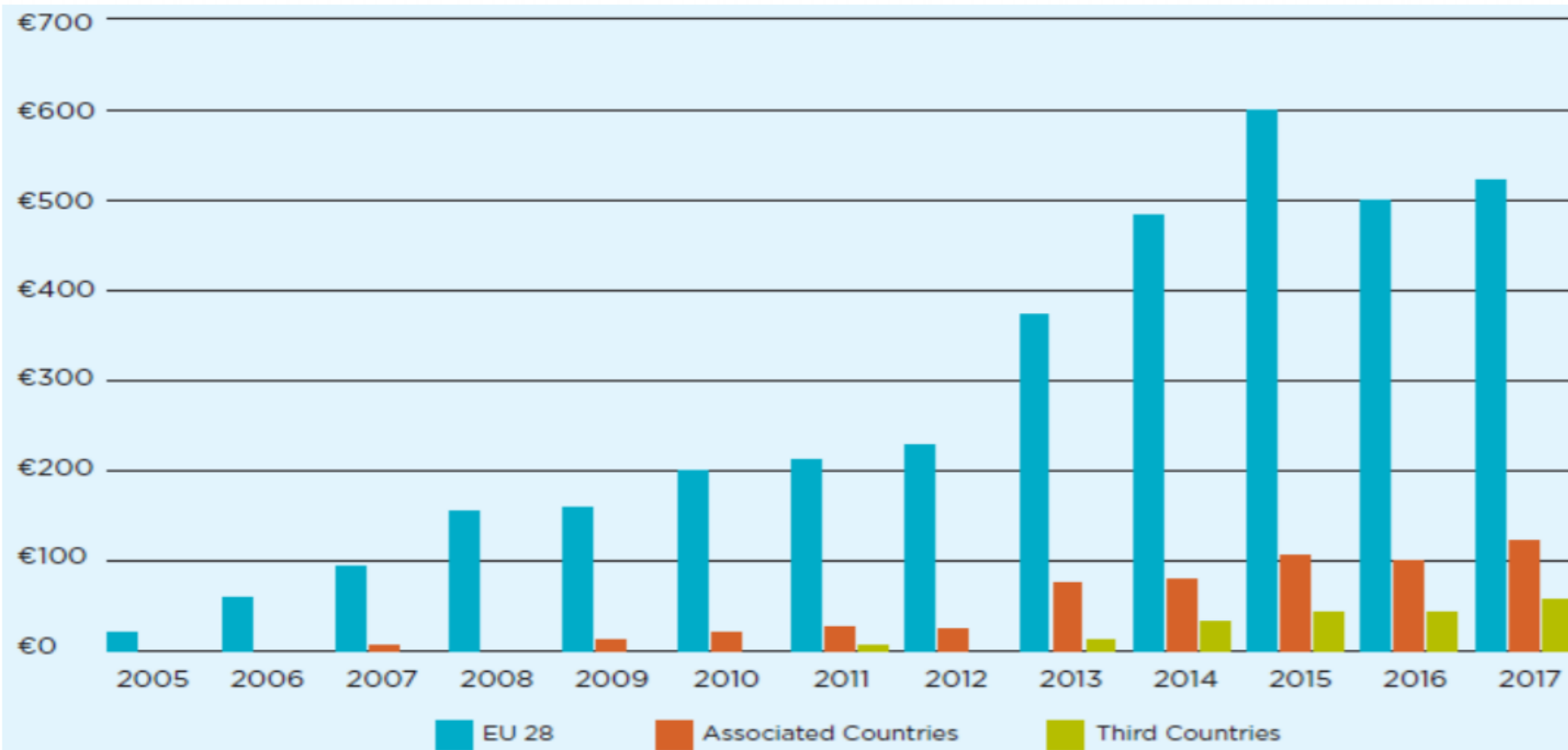
P2PS INVESTMENTS OVER THE YEARS

P2Ps INVESTMENTS OVER THE YEARS



JOINT ACTIVITIES

Mapping national/trans-national activities

Example 1 [BiodivERsA Strategic analysis](#)

BiodivERsA has used the BiodivERsA database to analyse selected features of the European funding landscape for biodiversity research. Since obtaining extensive information on all the competitive funding sources in a given country is hardly reachable, BiodivERsA mainly focused on the funding derived from the Framework programme at the European scale, and on BiodivERsA's funding agencies at the national one; these represent major players in funding research within their countries. Though such an analysis does not allow for a complete cross-country comparison, it can still elucidate some major trends in the funding of biodiversity research in Europe.

Example 2 [Map of Clusters and Competence Centers M-Era.net Consortium](#)

This mapping aims to support the transnational networking of clusters and competence centres in the thematic areas of M-ERA.NET by providing national/regional companies and research groups with a database to find matching partners for their business and research.

Foresight and Common vision

Example 1 JPI Oceans

The case study "[JPI Oceans Explores the Potential of Foresight Exercises](#)" shows how a participatory, stakeholder involving foresight process can serve as a tool to identify future research needs, challenges and solutions. The case study in particular presents the conceptualisation of strategic and thematic foresight plus insights into the implementation of a test run in the field of microplastics.

JOINT ACTIVITIES

Additional Joint calls

ERA-NET Cofund: 1 cofunded call with EC top-up funding is mandatory. In addition the networks can always decide to implement further joint calls without EC top-up funding. These calls are among the most frequently implemented joint activities.

Example 2 JPND annual calls

JPND is implementing the priorities identified in its research strategy through a range of large-scale programmatic initiatives. JPND intends to launch Calls for proposals each year to address high priority areas in neurodegenerative disease research. Since 2011, it has launched 7 calls for proposals that were not cofunded by the European Commission. The six first calls have enabled the pooling of 60 M€ across member countries.

Research Infrastructures

Example 1

JPI Oceans' Shared Research Vessel

The German Federal Ministry of Education and Research offered to share the use of its newly built research vessel RV SONNE during 118 days to support the transnational research project "Ecological Aspects of Deep-Sea Mining" launched by JPI Oceans in January 2015. This transnational research project aims to assess the ecological impacts that could arise from commercial mining of deep-sea minerals called polymetallic nodules. The cost-effective joint use of research infrastructure has facilitated the development of a common understanding and integration of national research activities around a common scientific objective. It has also enabled more effective collective European contributions to international policy-making.

Example 2

E-Rare Research Infrastructure Search facility

A rare diseases related European Research Infrastructures search function is available online at the E-Rare Web-portal.

JOINT ACTIVITIES

Widening Participation

Example 1

[TRANSCAN2](#): offers some examples of 'inclusiveness' measures (not exclusively addressing EU13):

- a) exchange/mobility schemes of individual researchers/ professionals in order to bring new expertise to an existing multidisciplinary translational team,
- b) recruitment of individual researchers/professionals in order to cover expertise and "knowhow" unavailable in the existing team,
- c) exchanges/mobility of researchers (especially young researchers) between teams and countries participating in the project to foster a multi-disciplinary approach in research,
- d) short term training of scientists, as well as operational staff,
- e) technical workshop referring to the scientific work planned in the project,
- f) short training (1 or few weeks) of several partner teams.

TRANSCAN2 also includes a specific task focused on developing a strategy to improve the partners' success in the joint call.

JOINT ACTIVITIES

Up-take of research results

Example 1 [JPI Climate Guidelines on Open Knowledge Policies](#)

The case study “[JPI Climate Guidelines on Open Knowledge Policies](#)” provides information on the process of establishing and disseminating open Knowledge Policies within a JPI. JPI Climate is among the first JPIS contributing to the development of Open Knowledge policies in the area of Joint Programming. The JPI Climate Guidelines on Open Knowledge summarize a set of policy recommendations geared at both internal (i.e. JPI Climate governance) and external (i.e. JPI Climate network activities) level. The Guidelines provide a solid basis for kicking-off Open Knowledge guidelines in other JPIS.

Example 2 [The OpenAire Platform](#)

OpenAire aims to establish an open and sustainable scholarly communication infrastructure responsible for the overall management, analysis, manipulation, provision, monitoring and cross-linking of all research outcomes (publications, related datasets, software and services) across existing, planned and future repositories. OpenAire supports the H2020 vision of open access for scientific publications and provide a central e-infrastructure and service in H2020.

JOINT ACTIVITIES

Internationalisation (activities related to extending cooperation to third / non-EU countries)

Example 1

[Urban Europe “Towards a Joint Call with China”](#)

The overall objective of the supporting activities presented is to facilitate “preparation of common ground”. Key supporting activities include desk research on the current development of smart cities in China as well as previous and current bilateral cooperation between the involved funding agencies with China. A more in-depth consultation process on the European side was also carried out to obtain detailed information regarding the experience and the expectation of working with China on smart cities.

Example 2

[JPI Water Mapping Beyond Europe report](#)

As a starting point, the Water JPI has mapped research and innovation activities (from funding to execution) in seven priority countries with which further collaboration could be sought: Brazil, Canada, China, India, South Africa, the United States and Vietnam. JOINT ACTIVITIES

Monitoring and evaluation/assessment activities both in relation to the network itself or the co-funded projects

Example 1 [JPND Monitoring and Evaluation](#)

JPND has established a monitoring and evaluation framework to develop indicators of success for JPND and to monitor the merits of the new Joint Programming approach to performing neurodegenerative disease research on the European level. The framework, fully integrated as an element of JPND, was created as a deliverable of the JUMPAHEAD action. It includes a set of performance indicators and a questionnaire for participating countries to investigate attitudes and opinions towards the JPND initiative.

Example 2 [M-ERA-Net Assessment Report](#)

M-ERA.NET has an excellent database, with a lot of well selected data compiled from call operation, proposal evaluation, and from beneficiaries during the lifetime of M-ERA.NET. In addition, data is used in this report which was compiled during the operation of M-ERA.NET predecessors MATERA and MNT-ERA.NET, or displayed in their final assessment reports.¹ Furthermore, a SWOT workshop and two web surveys – directed at M-ERA.NET work members and at beneficiaries and proposers – were performed to complete the data base for this assessment.

ERA-NET COFUND

ERA-NET Cofund under Horizon 2020 is designed to:

- ✓ support public-public partnerships, including joint programming initiatives between Member States,
- ✓ establishment of networking structures
- ✓ design, implementation and coordination of joint activities as well as Union topping-up of a trans-national call for proposals.

It is based on the merger of the former ERA-NET and ERA-NET Plus actions and is implemented by using 'programme co-fund actions'. It allows for programme collaboration in any part of the entire research-innovation cycle.

NB: The main and compulsory activity of the ERA-NET Cofund under Horizon 2020 is the implementation of the **co-funded joint call for proposals** that leads to the funding of trans-national research and/or innovation projects (one co-funded call per Grant Agreement).



ERA-NET Cofund – main features

- 
- ERA-NET Cofund: implementation of a co-funded joint call for proposals** (compulsory, one co-funded call per Grant Agreement)*
 - EU contribution:** mainly a proportional contribution to total public funding of the joint call
 - Additional EU contribution to coordination costs on the basis of a unit costs** for additional activities including additional calls without top-up funding
 - Stable reimbursement rate:** ERA-NET Plus reimbursement rate from FP7 (33%) applies
 - Co-funded calls:** proposal evaluation and selection according to Horizon 2020 standards

Activities related to the co-funded call and the consortium

CHI PUO' PARTECIPARE

Participants in ERA-NET Cofund actions must be **research funders**: legal entities owning or managing public research and innovation programmes other than Union funding bodies (see definition of "programme co-fund action" –Art 2.1.16 of Regulation 1290/2013 on H2020 Rules for participation).

Programme owners are typically national/regional ministries/authorities responsible for defining, financing or managing research programmes carried out at national or regional level.

Programme managers are typically research councils or funding agencies or other national or regional organisations that implement research programmes under the supervision of the programme owner (**FRRB**).

In the normal cash based ERA-NET **research institutions** cannot be partners. In the very specific case of an ERA-NET based on institutional programmes of governmental research organisations, with in kind contributions from their block funding, they can participate. They cannot claim coordination costs for additional activities. They have to be mandated by e.g. their ministry as programme owner.

CHI PUO' PARTECIPARE

Programmes funded by other entities (international programmes, foundations or other non-public programmes) may participate in case it is justified by the nature of the action, and only if the minimum conditions for participation are fulfilled by the entities participating in the joint trans-national call for proposals (three independent legal entities from three different Member States or associated countries).

A **state/province within a country** can participate in the ERA-NET and it is treated the same as if a member state participates. There is no problem for **a number of regions from the same country** to participate in the same ERA-NET action provided that the minimum conditions for participation are met.

As concerns **international organisations**, only international European interest organisations (as defined under Art 2.1.12 of the [H2020 Rules for participation](#)) are automatically eligible for funding from the Union budget. Other international organisations can only be exceptionally funded, under the same conditions as those applicable to legal entities established in third countries (see Art 10.2 of the [H2020 Rules for participation](#)).

FUNDING PRINCIPLES

Is there a minimum and maximum amount for the EU contribution?

There are no minimum or maximum amounts for ERA-NET actions. The Work Programme and PP topic pages normally specify indicative amounts for the Union contributions that are considered adequate for addressing the respective challenge. These are normally at least Euro 5 million. In any case, the requested amount should be duly justified in the proposal by the contributions from Participating States.

Is there a requirement for a minimum commitment from the Member States jointly of the consortium?

Yes, the joint commitment that is necessary to request the proportional Union contribution published in the H2020 Work programme and its calls. The consortium members should also be careful and make sure that everyone makes a realistic contribution that is in line with the expected requested funding from proposers of each country.

FUNDING PRINCIPLES

What is the exact process and financing principles for an ERA-NET based on in-kind contributions?

The call is normally based on a **call for proposals** resulting in grants to third parties.

The projects resulting from the co-funded call are carried out by the ERA-NET partners themselves. The in-kind contributions are the resources allocated as direct expenditure in the selected transnational projects that are not reimbursed by the Union contribution, but financed by each beneficiary out of their institutional funding.

The possibility to submit an ERA-NET based on in-kind contributions is described in the call text. Any ERA-NET based on in-kind contributions from institutional funding of governmental research organisations will be on the basis of a previous discussion between the Commission services and the ministries/their research organisations.

MODELLI PRINCIPALI

A. Implementation of a single joint call (MS contribution in cash)

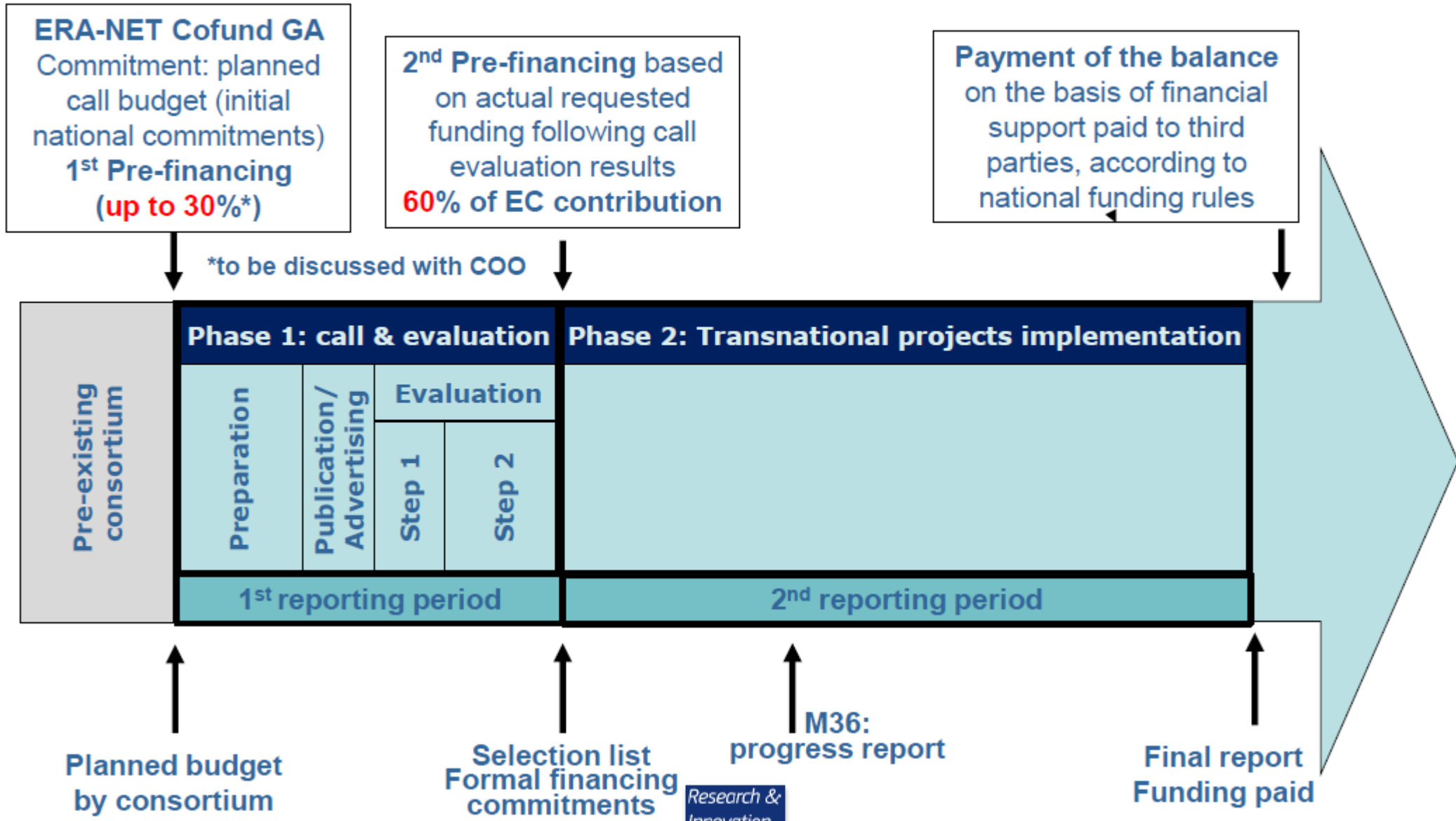

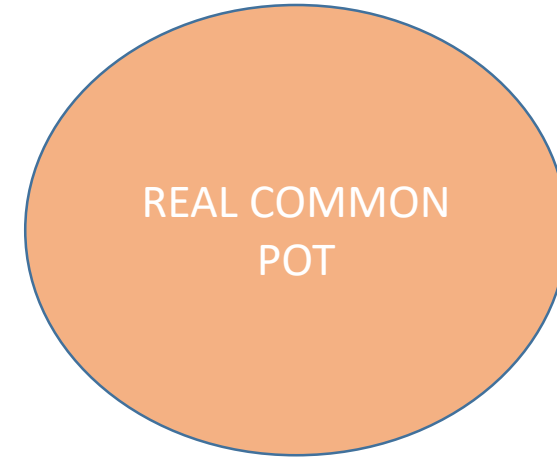
