Scope of EU health policy

- Primary responsibility for health systems within the EU lies with its Member States (Art. 168 TFEU). Member States are responsible for the definition of their health policy and for the organisation and delivery of health services and medical care.
- A high level of human health protection shall be ensured in the definition and implementation of all Union policies and activities. The EU complements national health policies and actions, encourages cooperation and coordination between Member States.
- Legislative EU competences in public health include: Quality and safety for medicinal products and medical devices; cross-border health threats; tobacco/alcohol regulations

Building a European Health Union

- A comprehensive approach to mental health
