The TSI will contribute in supporting the wide range of activities in which the Ministry of Health is committed in promoting mental health among children and adolescents

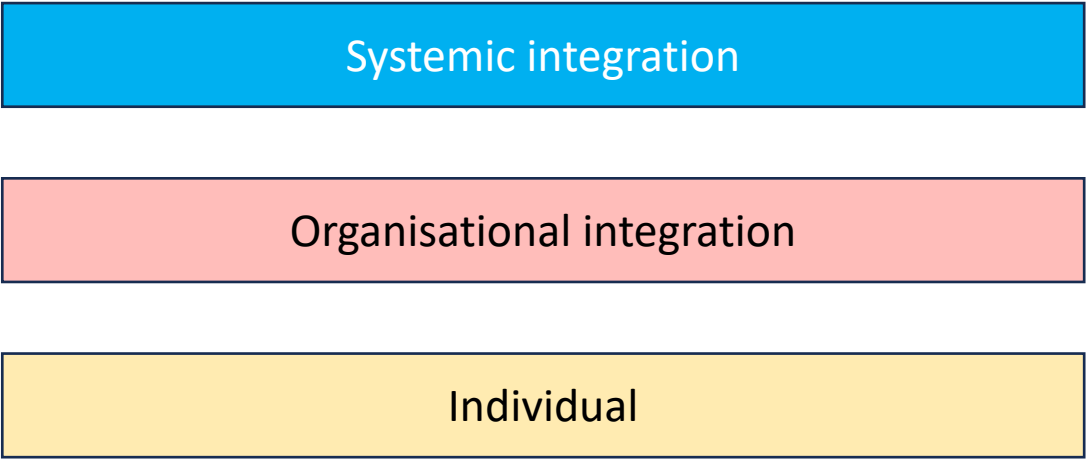
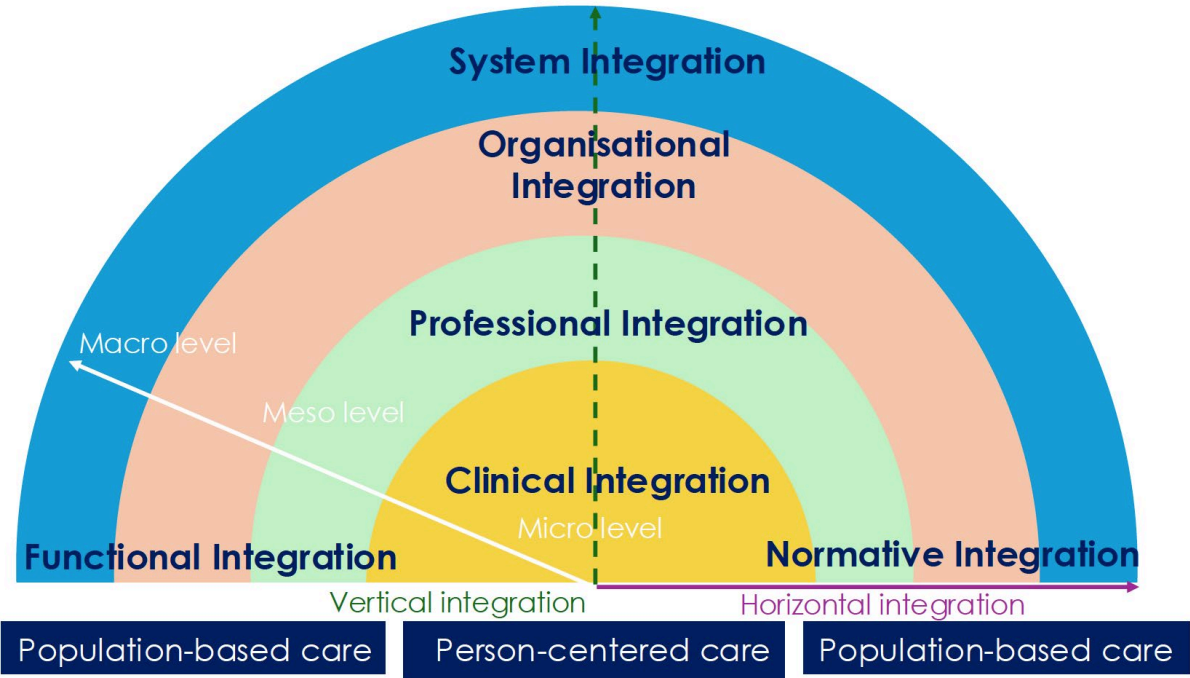
Strengthen the capacity for prevention and promotion of mental health and psycho-social well-being in Italy and to provide the necessary support to children and the most vulnerable adolescents.

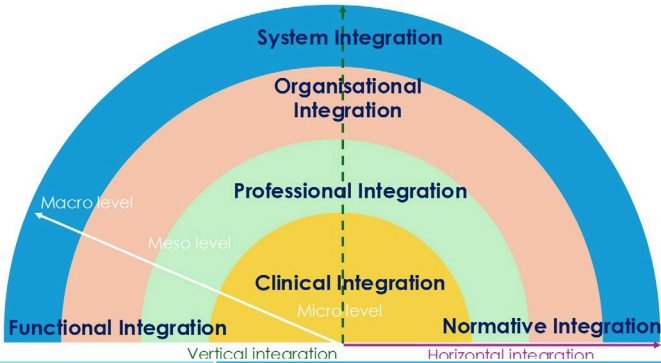

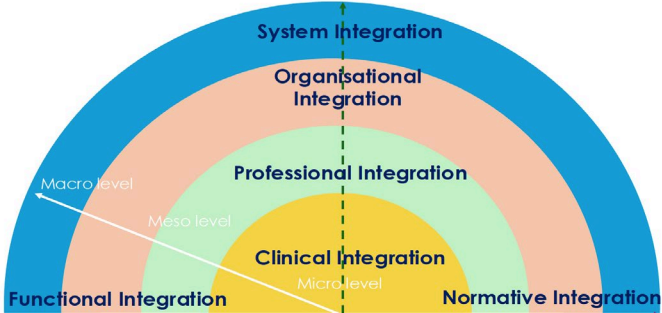
Systemic integration



Factor	Barrier Description	Facilitator Description
Cross-sector Collaboration	Lack of inter-organizational collaboration models; inadequate connection to community supports	Network partner collaboration
Information sharing	Poor communication systems between providers	Shared Electronic Health Record (EHR) and electronic referral orderset
Care pathways	No organized process for transition from pediatric to adult care	Improving continuity of care and transitions in care
Digital transformation	Lack of digital literacy	Positive attitudes towards using digital mental health services
Logistics	Transportation challenges	
Service availability	Fewer/lack available services compared to need	Flexible or responsive services
Policy and regulations	State licensing laws (impacting college-age youth)	
Funding	Poor reimbursement rates for mental health care

Workforce	Workforce recruitment; workflow challenges	Training of service providers ; Ongoing monitoring, evaluation, and improvement

Conclusions

- ❖ Uneven landscape of MHPSS integration across Italy
- ❖ Clinical and organizational integration quite advanced, innovative models of care coordination and inter-institutional collaboration in place
- ❖ Deeper levels of integration (functional, system, and normative) remain less developed

[R6] *"The Region offers many services with high-value expertise. However, while some sectors advance in an integrated manner, in others we still find great difficulties. The key to success is developing structural integration models, avoiding extemporaneous solutions linked to individual projects."*



Next steps



Identification of 3 Case Studies

Identify, through workshops with stakeholders, key factors that contributed to the program's success, the structural elements and the contingent elements

In Italy, valuable initiatives are building collaborations between healthcare, education, and social services.

Several regions are:

- ✓ Developing concrete integration pathways
- ✓ Strengthening intersectoral cooperation
- ✓ Experimenting with community-based and adolescent-centered models

Integration is an evolving process: many territories are already taking concrete and significant steps in this direction.

The challenge remains in standardizing these approaches across regions while respecting local contexts and needs



Why integration matters:

- Forms of distress must be interpreted through multiple lenses
- Single-sector interventions often fail to address root causes
- Prevention and promotion require multi-level collaboration
- **Our goal: Build sustainable integration public models rather than temporary project-based solutions**

Beyond Fragmented Innovation: The Path Forward

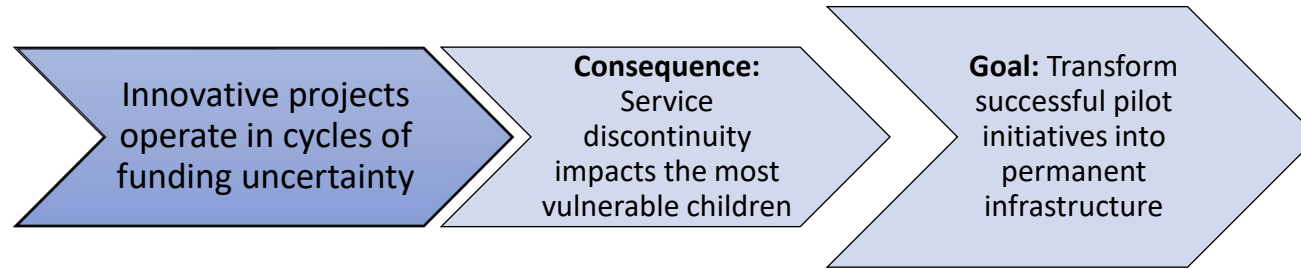
- TSI Project identified numerous excellent practices across Italy
- However, some of these initiatives remain fragile and unevenly distributed

Key Challenges:

- Geographic disparities in service availability and quality
- Dependence on individual champions rather than institutional structures
- Limited knowledge sharing between successful programs
- Frequent reinvention rather than adaptation of proven models

Building sustainable systems for children's wellbeing

From Project-Based to Systemic Solutions



Pathway to Sustainability:

1. Secure long-term funding mechanisms beyond project cycles
2. Integrate successful models into regional and national policies
3. Develop standardized frameworks while allowing for local adaptation
4. Invest in workforce stability and professional development
5. Establish evaluation systems to demonstrate impact and value
