Dialogue between young people and decision-makers (since 2010)

Link to youth goals and Commission Work Programme

Youth-led, implemented by national working groups

18 months cycles – steered by Trio Presidencies (current PL-DK-CY)

30,000 - 50,000 diverse young people in every cycle
